
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## **OUR VISION**

## MESSAGE FROM THE CHAIRPERSON OF THE BOARD

We are happy to report that in 2021, we were able to serve a total of 74 youths in the residential program and 522 in the CBM program. We have 18 trainees in our Vocational Technology program at the Matalinting farm, 78 youths enrolled in public high schools, and 8 in college. We also provided emergency support in the form of food, cash, and medical assistance to 1350 families and 72 individuals.

We are also pleased that the Matalinting camp and farm were successfully inaugurated. It is now being used for retreats and trainings.

As always, what is most inspiring though is not just the number of vulnerable youths served but the amazing stories of life transformation. They testify to how the love they experienced in Onesimo facilitated their conversion to Christ and initiated their healing journey. Thus, we are most grateful for the hard work of the 44 full-time and 8 part-time staff, as well as the partnership of 105 volunteer church workers.



This reminds me of the Good Samaritan (Luke 10:25-37) who went out of his way to respond to the wounded man's suffering. In this parable, Jesus teaches us what loving God and neighbor means. Loving God is not just about personal piety and it cannot be separated from loving our neighbors. In the parable Jesus also gave the word "neighbor" a new meaning, to include the vulnerable and marginalized, the poor, the oppressed, and the victims of violence. To love my neighbor means showing compassion that expresses itself in concrete acts of mercy.

In Onesimo we seek to demonstrate the love of God through companioning vulnerable youth so that they are protected, cared for, seen and heard, and in the process, enabled to thrive and flourish. We seek to join Jesus' mission to embody God's justice and compassion (Luke 4:18-19). Our heartfelt gratitude to our partners and supporters, for being in solidarity with us in this mission!

## MESSAGE FROM THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

Dear Friends of Onesimo,

The year 2021 was another year of trusting the Lordship of Jesus Christ over Onesimo.

We, in Onesimo, were able to serve the many children and youth at risk because you have trusted the Lord to trust us. Thank you. "The LORD is my strength and my shield; my heart trusts in Him, and He helps me. My heart leaps for joy, and with my song I praise Him" (Psalm 28:7, NIV). We mourned the death of people we love. A day where we needed someone to be with us, but cannot, for fear of Covid19. Facing uncertainty or difficulty in life. The situation around us seems beyond our understanding, but it is not beyond God's. In our hearts, we trust God knows what is going on — all the hows, whens, and whys. In times, when we do not know what to do or what will happen next, we cling to and trust that He does. Follow God's guidelines and commands knowing that as we practice obedience, He is working out the rest.



In 2021, He made this happen:

Provisions for the workers and in the rehabilitation program through residential care and Community-Based Ministry.

157 Workers of Onesimo: full-time, part-time, volunteers, church pastors, and workers able to continue their services for the youth at risk and for their families as well.

18 trainees graduated the vocational training in agriculture, housekeeping, and welding in Onesimo Farm and Campsite. 74 minor trainees were accepted into the 2-year program. Some prematurely left, some were successfully reintegrated into their families and continue to receive educational assistance, either formal or ALS.

522 Community Based Ministry (CBM) to young adults served (end-term 159, mid-term 167and new 196). All of them went through the Alternative Learning System (ALS) and were given skills training. Those 38 students were given assistance for high school and college education.

In Emergency support, 1,350 families and 72 individuals benefitted. They received 10 kilos of rice per family, assisted Covid19 patients with their food and vitamins during their quarantine period, gave financial help for funeral expenses, and extended medical assistance.

The Multi-purpose building, finally, got the occupancy permit after completing the requirements and finishing such as fire protection system, gas line piping, fire suppression, safety railings, pump room: paints, final payments, electrical, septic tank. We had a ceremonial cutting of the ribbon to mark its official opening. Also, the swimming pool was fully enjoyed as we were joined by its sponsor, Mr. Hans Brumann.

Indeed, the place is ready for the youth trainees' camps and other activities with 160 beds and a big basketball court. Onesimo Bulilit Foundation, Inc., agreed to partner in the development of the farm and campsite. Adding a safe kid's playground, a vehicle to transport children and youth to the site, and a viewing deck. Others:

We also had to be equipped with online class mode: purchased laptops, computer desktops, cellphones, upgraded internet service and computers, printers, office tables, electric fans, chairs, external drives, etc.

We are in awe of God's work. Bringing people together for a common goal.

#### PARTNER CHURCHES

For Onesimo, through a 2-year rehabilitation and transformative program of Community-Based Ministry (CBM), we aim to let the community partners represent underrepresented youths whose lives are at risk in their respective communities. Yearly, we are searching for churches in urban communities whose heart and passion are to help and minister to the said youths for them to have transformed lives.

We always quote this line whenever we are proposing to a prospective community/group/ church worker "someone who's useless to becoming a useful one". The quote gives emphasis to the overall mission and vision of Onesimo for the kind of youths we'd like to reach out to. We always hope that it wasn't a fearsome quote but a motivation for them to partner with us. As of this moment, it is a successful slogan to use as motivation to different communities every year despite restrictions due to the changing number of CoVid19 positive cases all over the Philippines! Indeed, God is Good!

522 youth at risk were served in 38 Partner churches

In 2021, Onesimo entered into a Memorandum of Agreement (MOA) with 2 new partner churches, 1 returnee partner, 10 renewed partners, 18 mid-term partners and 7 had concluded the partnership

# REACH PREVENTION

## **Program Orientation**

"You can't get it all right all the time, but you can try your best. If you've done that, all that's left is to accept your shortcomings and have the courage to try to overcome them", - Horace Jackson Brown Jr.

It was designed to provide church workers with the information they need to function and implement the 2-year program effectively inside the church. It is a planned introduction of new partners for their tasks, co-partners, and the Onesimo Foundation. A 3-day Program Orientation (re-orientation) was held at Onesimo Farm and Campsite from August 2-4, 2021, participated by pastors and workers from two (2) new partners, eighteen (18) mid-termers, and ten (10) who renewed the partnership.

## **Work Camp**

We can't deny the fact that a "pandemic" may sound like a consequence of human beings' shortcomings. All over the world, people are trying their best to adjust and adapt to the new normal by following a changeable restriction because of CoViD19 positive cases. Onesimo operation is not exempted; and as a result, outdoor activities which are mostly prevention programs were prohibited. We were unable to conduct a Work Camp for Batch 9 (2020-2022) beneficiaries. However, we still manage to reach out to youths at risk through referrals from alumni, parents from respective communities, and other organizations.

For the year 2021, we have tried our best to pursue the activity (following the government restrictions and standard health protocols) to let the outreached youth-at-risk experience a 3-5 days Work Camp for Batches 9 and 10 beneficiaries. But what is the importance of the said activity and why do the outreached youths need to experience this? Well, the answer is to enjoy the camp, to let them experience freedom from worries and harsh realities where they are trapped for years, and it is structured to provide a changing impact through different activities.





Work Camp was done by each partner churches in a venue enough to hold the activities without violating the government protocols.

By the end of 2021, Work Camp was experienced by a total of **355** beneficiaries in CBM program and **43** minors in Residential Care Program.

#### Batch 9 Beneficiaries (2020-2022) Work Camp

159 beneficiaries who joined the program in 2020 had their Work Camp only in 2021. Eighteen (18) churches that were in the middle of a 2-year program implementation conducted a Work Camp, by their choice of venue, and in line with the pattern of Onesimo's week-long camp program.

Acceptance Rites was organized too to appreciate the Work Camp completers. They received token, a welcome string bag, and a t-shirt, a reminder of them beginning a new journey.

Government restrictions were gradually being lifted by the third quarter of 2021. We were able to conduct two (2) batches of Work Camp at Onesimo Farm and Campsite, following the allowed number of people that OFC should accommodate.

## 43 Trainees Participated in Residential Work Camp

15 trainees, all boys admitted in 2020 had their work camp at Onesimo Farm and Campsite in January 2021 and in August, 28 trainees joined. Everyone enjoyed the activities prepared for them; including the farming and the spacious and green environment after being kept inside the center for almost a year due to quarantine protocols.





## **Leadership Training**

Praise God that for almost 2 years we were able to hold and train youth leaders for our Summer Youth Camps. Last December 26-30, 2021 we had our first Leadership Camp held at Onesimo Farm and Campsite.

A total of 48 youth leaders were trained to lead our upcoming camps from 4 partner churches and from Onesimo Residential trainees. Each batch will be handling at least 70-85 delegates next year that they are eager to reach out to young people in their community.

One leader testified, "I am overwhelmed with how the Lord uses my life to share the gospel. Although, some of our leaders before did not continue when the pandemic started. Still, we thank the Lord for the new breed of leaders and grateful that I am one of them."

## REACH REHABILITATION

#### **Basic Needs**

As a resource agency of partner communities, Onesimo's financial counterparts were consistently distributed by community coordinators.

Purchases were done by pastors and workers accompanied by community coordinators. The budget allotted is for meals, clothing, hygiene, indoor games and church materials for homelife training such as eating and kitchen utensils, sleeping and cleaning materials.

We also distributed medicine kits not just for basic/first aid needs but also as part of the prevention of contracting the CoViD19.


## **Discipleship Training**

Why is it important? For us, a faith-based organization, of course, it is! We want beneficiaries to become fully committed followers of Christ. To help them to grow in their faith, to grow in maturity and wisdom, and build their faith on a strong foundation. So that they can have firm decision-making after the program, not only for themselves but also for their respective communities. Youths undergo discipleship training and values formation daily while living in their shelters/churches.

Additional activity for this training is an evangelistic camp where they are taught different topics to prepare them as they jump to the Equipping Phase (ALS and Skills Training Class outside the church). Topics discussed on camps were bible stories of change, creatively titled "In Love Ka Ba? Paano Mo Nasabi?" (A Godly Relationship), and "Tara G!, Pagpili ng Mabuting Impluwensiya" (Peer Pressure).

## REACH REHABILITATION

#### **Psycho-Social Support**

Some forget that the mind is part of our being, an essential part of our body. We recognized the importance of the fitness of our beneficiaries' minds and only focus on keeping their physical body healthy.

Man is only considered superior to other animals because of his highly developed brain. So, we need to help keep both their body and mind fit and healthy. Both mental health and physical health go hand in hand and are equally important for optimum performance and quality of life.

We started a psycho-social support journey for the beneficiaries.

Conducted training on "Raising Awareness about Mental Health" to the crucial part which is identifying youth who need professional help.

For the last quarter of 2021, we were able to educate and raise awareness among eighty-eight (88) youths, 5 pastors, and nine (9) church workers from Manila area partners (Cluster 4). One youth is undergoing continuous professional counseling. We aim to continue the advocacy of this journey for partners and specifically youths who will become part of the 2-year program.



## REACH REHABILITATION

#### All of Life Graduation

Pandemic has limited us in doing outreach. Yet, a total of 26 clients were rescued and finished the 6-month Homelife Training. We witnessed how they all transformed from being disoriented, untidy, malnourished, disrespectful to fellow trainees, full of doubts and sadness, no idea of cleanliness, does not know household chores, and does not pray or recognize God. All of them expressed their appreciations to Onesimo.

All of Life Graduation was held on May 27, 2021 in the Onesimo building, some personnel and clients' parents attended via Google Meet as Onesimo still had to follow the IATF's protocol. Ptr. Edeson Sevilla, one of the coordinators of CBM department, is the speaker at the aforementioned graduation.





## **Effect of Quarantined Restrictions**

Youths were bored in the center because there were no outdoor activities. They were a little disappointed because they were not seeing their family nor participated in an outdoor recreation program. It is helpful to have internet access to have video called with their families.

Houseparents and social workers almost ran out of ideas for keeping them busy. They organized various activities to keep the youngsters entertained on a daily basis.

"Tiniis nila yung boredom, dahil walang outdoor activities. Ang lungkot na hindi nakikita ang family. Mabuti nalang nagkaroon ng kamustahan thru FB Messenger kahit papaano naibsan ang lungkot ng mga bata at magulang. ## **ALTERNATIVE LEARNING SYSTEM (ALS)**

## **Residential**

by Onesimo Adult Education Program (OAEP)

A year ago was one of the toughest times since the CoViD19 breakout. Year 2021, the department was still in some adjustment on how to carry on with the programs without delay and adequate quality education for clients. Since we remained in contact with the Department of Education in Quezon City, we managed to update and keep on the latest approach to the Alternative Learning System.





We were able to participate in the Portfolio Assessment for the School Year 2019 - 2020 as 13 clients passed the assessment. While for School Year 2020 - 2021, we have 1 client and 2 from the community who also passed the assessment. The recognition of these passers was included in the All of Life Graduation last May 27, 2021. Passers of secondary are able to enter the Senior High School level, and the elementary can enroll in the Secondary Level.

The Alternative Learning System Department of Education Quezon organized the first "Gawad Parangal" in recognition of the efforts of the Instructional Manager/Facilitators of ALS. Our teachers Gerry Rose Umali, John Allen Cruz, and Charito Mata were the awardees. Loyalty awards were also given to Charito Mata for 13 years of service as Instructional Manager.



## **EQUIP**

## **ALTERNATIVE LEARNING SYSTEM (ALS)**

## **Residential**

Administered by our own Onesimo Adult Education Program (OAEP) teachers

In continuation of the education program, the Functional Literacy Test was conducted for the new trainees in every center. The result was 2 new learners in Basic Literacy Program Level, 8 in Elementary Level, and 10 in the Secondary Level. We conducted the program through online classes since the minors were not allowed outside. The teachers also did center visits once a month for a face-to-face class, collection of outputs, and checking up of the computers and printers they used.



"Many Filipinos do not have a chance to attend and finish formal basic education (Grades 1-6 and Year 1-4) due to many reasons. Some drop out of school while some do not have schools in their communities. Since every Filipino has a right to free basic education, the government establishes ALS to provide all Filipinos the chance to have access to and complete basic education in a mode that fits their distinct situations and needs". It is an answer from the Department of Education, which also fits Onesimo's program that answers the many "why questions", and a solution for the education of urban poor youth at risk.



231 youths were ALS enrolled. Being tutored closely or assisted to complete the ALS program and eventually passing ALS A&E Examination and be recommended for the next level.

# **EQUIP SKILLS TRAINING**

## **Residential**

by OAEP

When the pandemic hit, Skills Training Exposure was added to the plan as a way for learners to put what they had learned throughout the three months of training into practice. This year, we put this strategy into action so that students may witness the benefits of working on the farm and starting their own business. Making daing na bangus, pickles, coco jam, coffee processing, goat milk pasteurization, reviewing utensils and equipment used in food processing, and costing were among the topics covered during the five-day on-the-job training, which took place on January 18-22. On the last day, we organized a short award ceremony and gave their OJT completion certificates to the outstanding on-the-job training students. The program went off without a hitch, and eighteen (18) students completed their Onthe-Job Training with the help of OAEP and Farm and Campsite staff.

#### **Food Processing and Housekeeping**

It has been another year that the pandemic persists, so we decided to offer another course that will benefit our Farm and Campsite, which are OAEP partners in providing on-the-job training. We are once again offering the Food Processing course and the new Housekeeping Skills Training course. Food Processing is held in the morning, and Housekeeping is held in the afternoon for around an all-day virtual class. Not all of the housekeeping modules were completed. We only chose those that could be used at the Farm and Campsite for on-the-job training.





# **EQUIP SKILLS TRAINING**

#### MODULE OFFERED IN HOUSEKEEPING

**Providing Housekeeping Services** 

This course deals with the skills and knowledge required to provide housekeeping services for guests within the tourism industry. This course also provides a glimpse of the duties and responsibilities of the different positions under the Housekeeping Department. There are two more modules associated with Providing Housekeeping Services.

## **CBM**

For us to help the youths be equipped, Onesimo assisted the youths to grab opportunities and to acquire quality technical education and training programs, so they can be employed or use it to sustain their living after the program. We aim to let them enhance their existing skills or learn new skills and assist them to become certified in their competencies, thus helping them acquire better opportunities.

136 completed skillstraining, 63 are ongoing, and24 have pursued the formal schooling

Beneficiaries were assisted to choose one skill that fit them. Skills acquired were Electrical, Welding, Basic Cookery/Bread and Pastries,
Housekeeping Services, Driving, Hilot Wellness Massage (NCII), Beauty Care, Barista, Plumbing, Tiles Setting,
Scaffolding, Basic Computer/Servicing, English Proficiency, Refrigerator and Aircon Tech, Construction Painting, Small Engine, Carpentry & Farming (OFC Program).
For minors, Skills taught were Food Processing, Food Prep, and Basic Housekeeping Service.

# **EQUIP SKILLS TRAINING**

#### **Distribution of Learning Materials/Tools**

#### **Computer Set**

As a result of the survey for the needs and adaptability versus the CoViD19 pandemic last 2020, partner churches were granted computer sets to be used for the online classes of ALS and Skills Training. Half of the amount (P20,000.00) was subsidized by Onesimo through our generous donors specifically for this need and half of it was the counterpart of the church. It was a counterpart basis, for them to own and take responsibility for the usage and overall care of the learning tool.



#### **School Supplies Set**

Distribution of boxes with school supplies set aims to help our partners and youths is one of the easiest tasks but a struggle in time of the pandemic, purchasing supplies in stores. This was a result of an "anytime-can-change" community quarantine restrictions. It was the reason we decided on the 3rd quarter of 2021, that we distributed a box of "almost complete" school supplies where they would not need anything because it was inside of what they received.

## PERSONAL ENHANCEMENT LEADERSHIP TRAINING

Personal Enhancement & Leadership Training were also conducted through virtual classes. There were 18 clients who completed the program. The end retreat of level 2 took place at Iluminada Resort in Bulacan on May 10-12 with the theme "Stand Strong".





Level 1 of PELT was also started. These were the new trainees who entered the equipping phase. 20 clients were enrolled. The program ended in December with a retreat activity at Onesimo Farm and Camp. "Forgive to Forget" was the main topic at the said event.

## **CBM**

#### **MOBILIZATION TO COMMUNITY**

Bringing the youths back to their respective communities is the goal of the slogan "Someone who's useless to becoming a useful one". Youths were expected to try and apply what they had learned after a 2-year program. It is the program's after-process of engaging while sustaining, surviving, and becoming a useful youth in his or her community.

#### **End Retreat**

A week-long camp or retreat is preparation for community mobilization of youths for a new battle and a new chapter in their life's journey. Youths were taught about different topics, which were reminders of why they are under the program: what is the best direction to take? What is the focus of their intention? What is the goal of their changes? The year 2021 was a roller coaster ride when it came to CoViD19 positive cases that affected the quarantine restriction. The said activity happened in February and March, the times when the capacity of Onesimo Farm and Campsite (and even other venues) was mandated allow only 50% to accommodated. We successfully conducted 4 batches of camp for 15 churches, with the participation of 117 youths, 14 pastors, 22 youth workers, 2 volunteers, and 11 staff. We're still blessed!



#### **Employment and Small-time Practical Business**

Being back in their communities might sound easy, but sustaining their lives is one of the hardest. To help them sustain themselves, Onesimo is granting a budget (by their choice, with approval and monitoring) based on their potential, from their job application to employment, and from their business proposal to self-employment.

In the 2nd quarter of the year 2021, 54 youths were granted the self-employment budget, and 35 youths were supported for their job application/employment budget. 51 out of 140 youths who were candidates for graduation continued and focused on their studies through formal schooling.

In the last quarter of the year 2021, we asked for the status update of Batch 8 beneficiaries who graduated from the program and availed of the mobilization grants. We found out that 34 are currently employed, while 32 are surviving their small-time practical business, 11 are pursuing their studies, 5 youths are still looking for a job, and 2 youths are staying in their house to take good care of their family members. The remaining 56 have no status updates. Our partners gave some reasons: they returned to their province, changed their home address, or had no communication after graduation.

## **MOBILIZE**

#### **Batch 8 Graduates**

We were not able to hold a CBM-wide graduation ceremony due to restrictions, a gathering of big groups was prohibited by the government. But we don't want to miss the celebration of a 2-year journey under the program. Church or by-area graduation ceremonies were conducted by our partner churches. Out of 244 youths from 2019 who entered, 140 successfully completed the program.



#### **Appreciation Day**

This is a ceremony for all trainees who have completed the two-year residential program. They are assessed as ready for the eventual reintegration into their family and community as recommended by the houseparent and social worker. This year, a total of 18 clients have been reintegrated and referred to the After Care program to help them with their educational needs while simultaneously monitoring them.



## AFTER CARE PROGRAM

## REFRESH AND REFLECT AMID PANDEMIC

Because everyone was unprepared for the protocols and restrictions, a high percentage of people experienced anxiety as a result of the prolonged lockdown, limited sources of income, and high waves of virus infections.

Regardless of the circumstances, we had a simple gathering of teenagers at Matalinting Farm in Sta. Maria, Laguna, where we conducted reflection, relaxation, and assisted the farm staff in cleaning and beautifying the area.

## AFTER CARE PROGRAM

# Served 73 boys and girls Received assistance in their education while being monitored

An Onesimo program wherein youth trainees are either reunited with their families/guardians, got employed, enrolled back to school, being sent for independent living after being in the residential program. The focus here is more on guiding them to be self-reliant, responsible, and living in service to others.

This year, we removed 19 trainees from the After Care program. Some of them were keen to continue their schooling with the support of their own families despite their meager income. Some trainees had just stopped their studies for various reasons, like early pregnancy and some opted to work instead of continuing their studies, as they find it difficult to study while seeing their families struggling every day, for their daily basic needs.

44 trainees reintegrated were monitored in their journey outside Onesimo and 29 students from the Macabud community were monitored and supported in their education and financial needs.

On December 13–15, 2021, the farm site hosted another evaluation and camp for teenagers. The After Care beneficiaries participated in a three-day and two-night activity. This allows them to assess their progress in all aspects of their lives.

Sir Jestan Gino Gaviola and Ma'am Chat Mata facilitated the discussions on "ABCs of Success". They instill eight most important things to keep in mind:

- 1. Knowledge
- 2. Outstanding Education (informal or formal)
- 3. Focus
- 4. Experience
- 5. Communication Skills
- 6. Wide Social Base (social network)
- 7. Positive Personality
- 8. Time and Chance (luck).

In addition, in the evening, we built a bonfire for sharing and giving thanks. We heard their perspectives on how they define success in their lives. It is clear that, despite the pandemic outbreak, our teenagers have a solid foundation because all of their worries and struggles are accepted as part of the process of maturing into responsible adults.

## **Annual General Meeting (AGM)**

Just like the previous year, Onesimo still held its AGM digitally through Zoom last June 8, 2021. One year after CoViD19 emerged, the people were still in fear of the virus because of the new variants. Movements are still limited. Yet, we still managed to conduct the event.

The event was attended by the community of Onesimo and all the Board of Trustees (BOT) were present. Parents' and clients' stories of change and reconciliation were shared and the accomplishments were presented through VTR.

The program concluded with the election of the BOT. Due to the fact that Tita Baby and Atty. Romel were serving their final term on the Board of Trustees when they decided to resign, leaving two open spots on the BOT.

The board members were allowed to vote via Google forms with the assistance of staff, and two new BOT members were selected. Atty. Eugene Villanueva and Atty. Joel Butuyan was appointed to fill the vacancy.



## **Family Fun Day**

Since mass gatherings were still forbidden and there were still many Covid cases, our annual Family Fun Day was done again virtually. We were able to deliver the Christmas bags to all of our beneficiaries' families. Thanks to the efforts of all our workers, who took turns in their schedules to go and visit various CBM churches and After Care youth. During our visits, we thanked the Lord for His safety and guidance.

Despite the fact that this was our 2nd year of Virtual Fellowship, we had a great time organizing it, even on the day of the gathering. Some of the workers were at the Onesimo Building, while others, including CBM members, were at the Residential Centers. We were able to participate in virtual games, watch presentations, and listen to Kuya Chris Schneider's message. Since much of the technical side was new to us, our team was fortunate to have Rachel Dee Pecio on the team. The program's success was due to a collaboration of creativity and intelligence. We praise God for the people He continues to use as a bridge to assist us in carrying out our plans.

## **Deepwell Project in Macabud**

Through the help of Rachel Hauser, a Swiss Missionary, and a donation from Switzerland friends, Onesimo church partner in Macabud, Montalban initiated a Deepwell Project for the community. Families used to get water from a nearby barangay deep well water supply, passing through the muddy pathway. Now they have access to water for their household conveniently.





## LIFE TESTIMONIES

## **ALLAN JOHN ENRIQUEZ**

ALLAN JOHN ENRIQUEZ is 16. Born into a poor Bulacan family

According to the worker who visited the client, his house is small and made of light materials. It lacks a proper receiving and sleeping area.

Due to the small space, they share a bed. So, Allan's dream is to save money and fix their home. And his meager income (P100-150) isn't enough to fund his simple dream.

Nevertheless, Allan never lost hope and tried to act, believing it will happen in the future. For now, he attends elementary school. He is not ashamed of his situation and wants to set an example for other out-of-school children. Although Allan is not the eldest, he used to support the family.

Allan's past in the community was a mess. He dropped out of school in 2017 due to his history of fighting, bullying, and computer game addiction. His family is poor, so he neglects his education and concentrates on his job as a fish porter at the public market, where he earns P50-100 per day.

He said he spent all his money on his vices. Using alcohol and cigarettes. He became a night rioter and a burden to his family.

In 2019, he learned about Onesimo and joined the residential program for two years to improve his housekeeping and food preservation skills. He was encouraged to return to school and mentored to understand his life goal of helping his family.

Back to his family and community, Allan is in his modular class and returned to the public market to work, not to disturb the community. He had a new boss and he liked her boss because he is generous and kind. Because he has experience trading in fish ports, he is encouraged to save money.

His actions and decisions became his responsibility. Inconsistencies and bad peers can cause problems in a person's life, so he encourages them to return to school, be good, and avoid them.

All of his income is now going to household expenses and savings. He believes that with just a few dollars he can start a small business that will help them.



## CAPABILITY BUILDING

#### **CBM and After Care Staff Stress Debriefing**

This activity started with the following questions: "How do you manage your stress? What are the activities you do to cope with it?" It was a simple survey, answers were collected, and the activities are well planned. Food, nature, swimming, massage, storytelling or sharing time, and more are everything that gives us relaxation physically and mentally. Before 2021 ended, we were blessed to experience all of these. It was not a usual structured learning process but a debriefing as a way of relaxation, to continuously evolve plans for the CBM and After Care programs, while it is being executed. For us to process the events that happened and minimize the high possibility of ministry burnout.





#### **Residential Staff Stress Debriefing**

In Palm Bliss, Laguna, residential staff, volunteers, and After Care performed a stress debriefing. Because there was no one to observe or monitor the children at the center, they were separated into two groups. Our facilitator in this session is Ate Juliet Andaya.

The objectives of stress debriefing are to elicit participants' expectations of the stress debriefing as well as to assist participants in establishing the proposed attitude for the debriefing.

Ate Juliet discussed resilience, which she defined as "an individual's ability to overcome adverse life situations by drawing on their own and socially-mediated resources and using them as an opportunity to develop."

Welter-Enderlin, R., 2006. He stated that everyone must be able to keep resilience, especially in the task of each one in Onesimo because it is challenging work.

The stress debriefing was enjoyed, relaxed, and revitalized by all. Thank you very much.



## **CAPABILITY BUILDING**

#### Sabbath

This year, Onesimo's program departments have taken a break. Despite the pandemic, they spent their sabbath at a transitory house in Tagaytay, where they were able to bond comfortably.

#### **Staff Retreat**

Despite the fact that the staff retreat was held in OFC this year, it was also the most demanding retreat the Onesimo has ever had. The team intended to enjoy the retreat while adhering to the Covid guidelines, yet several of us were still infected.

Some of us tested positive for Covid and were in the facility for longer than expected. However, we were able to continue the retreat with the support of Kuya Tim Mccowan's spiritual companion team, who were able to join the staff with online sessions and one-on-one companionship during those difficult times.

Despite the unforeseen challenge, we are still fortunate to have those who have been by our side during our darkest hours.

Some of us who became infected were eventually able to recover from covid and only had minor symptoms.

#### Staff Planning and Evaluation

Our preparation and evaluation took place in Onesimo Training Center, the same as the previous year. However, we made certain that the covid protocols were followed. Each department was in its own room, and we interacted via online meetings.

#### **Online Seminars**

Despite the continuation of CoViD19, staff continued to access additional information via online webinars. Additionally, one of the great successes of online webinars is the constant interaction with various networks.

#### **Staff Reorientation**

The purpose of the staff reorientation is to review the goals and objectives of Onesimo's various departments to determine what needs to be added, removed, or improved to the overall operation of the organization.

#### **Pastors and Workers Fellowship**

Restrictions gave us a hard time conducting a monthly fellowship with pastors and workers but, we managed to at least compensate for it through consistent weekly communication of coordinators and conducted retreats by the time restrictions were lifted.

## Pastors and Workers Retreat at Rizal Re-creation Center

The CoViD19 crisis is unlike anything we've experienced before. One of the scariest things is uncertainty. Everything keeps changing: just when it feels like things might be getting better, they seem to get worse again (restrictions, positive cases, youth status, and personal/family struggles). We hate uncertainty and want guaranteed answers. Because there aren't any – and because it sometimes feels like there's so much different information flying around – our anxiety is often likely to be high. Again, this is the newest normal thing in the world! And of course!, we care for our partners, who are not only program implementers but also a family to Onesimo.



## **PARTNERSHIP**

#### **LIKHABI**

"LikHabi" - an advocacy arm of Lilok Foundation
A group consisting of young people weaving relationships that foster a loving, free, resilient, and safe community. The group's mission is to create actions that are natural and organic, intelligently engage with organizations and churches and be a bridge of opportunity for young people. In line with Onesimo's psychosocial support services, LikHabi facilitates different workshops and one of their campaigns is raising awareness of mental health. It's a signal for us. We pursued an official partnership with LikHabi last October 8, 2021. It is a long process of raising awareness but a fulfilling partnership for the benefit of beneficiaries.

- Pastors Pre-Assessment Status and Recommendation of Youth In-Need
- LikHabi's Facilitation of "Mental Health Awareness" workshop
- Program Beneficiaries (Peer Counseling)
- Referral of Pastors and Workers for those youths in need of help
- Assessment and Evaluation of Psychometrician
- Recommendation for Counseling Session or Professional and Medical attention



## R.I.S.E - a program powered by MakeSense Philippines

MakeSense is a rapidly growing international bringing together and supporting community engaged citizens, passionate entrepreneurs, and forward-looking organizations to collectively tackle today's social and environmental issues. Its mission is to inspire and empower citizens, innovators, and companies to build an inclusive and sustainable society together. One of its programs is the R.I.S.E. Scholarship or Reducing Inequalities in Skills and Employment. Pastor Westly, one of CBM's partners introduced MakeSense, for he saw the same mission was being performed by both the organizations. Fortunately, we passed the qualifications of MakeSense to become their partner focusing on the employment of beneficiaries. Fifteen beneficiaries were chosen to be part of 50 youths coming from 6 different NGOs and become scholars of the program. The program aims to train the youth's ability in development, leadership, community and employability skills and to rise and have the opportunity to be employed for a better future.




## **PARTNERSHIP**

## **Accomplishment of Major Projects**

#### Multi-Purpose Building (MPB)

The construction of the Multi-Purpose Building or MPB was finally completed last year. The building was officially turned over last July, followed by the handover of the As-built plan and other critical documents. Last September, the fire department conducted a final inspection, and the following month, the certificate of occupancy was received.





#### **OFC 5th Anniversary**

On June 23, the new facility and pool were dedicated as part of our 5th-anniversary celebration at OFC.

The program began with ribbon-cutting for the new MPB. Ms. Josefina Gutierrez, board chair, offered her congratulations to the entire Onesimo. Rev. Nestor Ravilas also spoke encouraging words. Mr. Patrick Indlekofer, a trustee, and Ms. Juliet Andaya, executive director of the Onesimo Bulilit Foundation, also wished as well.

Continuing the program, our Municipal Mayor of Sta Maria, Laguna appeared at the occasion. She also wished the event well. Our Program Director Rev. Dennis Manas followed with a heartwarming message and thanksgiving from our Executive Director Ms. Rosa Pecio. Mr. Chris Schneider also inspired everyone.

Following the dedication prayer delivered by Rev. Benjamin Polidario, everyone walked around the building and prayed. The guests then made a ceremonial throw for the basketball court led by Rev. Efren Roxas.

Around 150 people joined to celebrate. After the meal, everyone headed to the pool area to see the ribbon-cutting and unveiling of our donor's plaque. By God's grace, the event was successfully hosted.

## The swimming pool






Mr. Hans Brumann was present to cut the ribbon to signify the opening of the swimming pool he and his wife Maria largely funded.

#### **Camping and visitors**

This year's OFC camping program also started well. 2-day visit of Bethel Ministry Christian Family Church youth leaders in Caloocan for church planning. Client workcamps for Residential Program Boys and Onesimo Alternative Education Program departments followed. Beneficiaries from clusters 2 and 6 held Work Camps in late January. Even if the guests simply stayed at the farmhouse, they liked the green environment and learning about farming.



The new facility (MPB) opened in mid-year, allowing us to accommodate more people. The swimming pool is a terrific addition to the farm's attractions. Some families choose the farm for their child's dedication and family gatherings.

Work camps, winter camp, workers fellowship, general reflection, mini sports-fest, personal enhancement, SYCO leadership planning and training, and Onesimo staff retreat were held in the OFC multi-purpose building.









### **Vocational Training**

One of the farm's objectives is to educate young people from Manila's slum regions and neighboring rural areas about Slope Agricultural Land Technology (SALT). We implement the Mindanao Baptist Rural Life Center's (MBRLC) program, which includes Organic Agriculture Production in its curriculum.

OFC has two batches of agricultural trainees this year, the third and fourth since the program's inception. The third batch consisted of five students, two of whom had recently completed the two-year CBM program and are now working in OFC as project-based workers, and two trainees, one of whom is from the urban community of Pajo, Baesa, Quezon City. OFC gave training to existing employees to ensure they had a firm foundation in SALT and Organic Agriculture.

The third batch of training began in February and ended in the first week of June; graduation for this batch occurred on June 23, the farm's fifth anniversary.

### **OFC Product and by Products**

This has been a fantastic year for farm workers. Despite their heavy workloads, our agricultural employees continue to cultivate crops and vegetables. Past campers' and trainees' farming endeavors had greatly aided vegetable production. The first half of the year's fruit and vegetable crops were abundant.

OFC was able to produce byproducts: coco jam, atchara, coffee, and vegetables.

# **GLOSSARY**

**Onesimo, OFI** – names for the Onesimo Foundation, Inc.

**Residential** – youth-at-risk or in conflict with the law with ages from 14 to 18, cared for in a specially designed 2-year course.

**CBM** – Community/Church-Based Ministry. Major Onesimo Program for eighteen (18) year-olds and above. Churches in urban-poor communities partner with Onesimo which acts as resource providers for CBM to provide manpower and venue.

After Care Program - follow-up program seeks to help residential clients fully adapt to family life in their communities after the 2-year residency has been completed. It consists of a senior social worker and an experienced community worker.

**Trainee** – usually a youth in the first year of the Onesimo (2-year) Program

**Client** – a term used for youth in the residential program; used to differentiate from the youth enrolled in the CBM program

Kuya, Ate – honorifics given to clients who have completed the first year of the 2-year program. The Kuyas and Ates help take responsibility for guiding trainees through their first steps in the program. They instruct the new ones in the new life, do's and don'ts, and expectations at the work camp. At the residential centers, they serve as models for the trainees. During Summer Youth Camps, they augment the church youth leaders and are given opportunities to enhance their gifts.

**Beneficiary** – a term used for the youth in the CBM program; used to differentiate from the youth enrolled in the Residential Program

Summer Youth Camps with Onesimo or SYCO (pronounced as /síko/) - started when urban-poor youth are invited from various slum communities in Metro Manila. Now as implemented by Onesimo, partner churches from urban poor communities host week-long summer camps at Onesimo's Camp Rock Retreat Center in Puerto Galera, Mindoro, and in Onesimo Farm and Campsite. Onesimo trains camp leaders, and heavily subsidizes camp fees so that urban poor youth may experience God's beautiful creation while being taught God's Word through tailored activities designed to challenge youth to leadership roles in church and community. meetings churches Coordination for commissioning of youth leaders (with a strict understanding of the Onesimo Child Protection Policy) continue in January & February of the Camp Year. Partnership with churches may go on for 5 years unless terminated due to subperformance or violations of Onesimo policies.

**PELT** – Personality Enhancement and Leadership Training 2-year parallel training to Skills and Academics also administered by the OAEP. It has psychological and spiritual components augmenting discipleship which takes place in the residential centers.

**OFC** - Onesimo Farm and Campsite **MPB** - OFC Multi-Purpose Building
